
"We will be delivered from the hands of our enemies, and all those who hate us"

It was good to hear your voice yesterday. I do not call you "friend" to flatter you but refer to the bond we established during our meetings last year, when I presented my research data to you at your offices.

Allow me to encourage your efforts to support my project to prove the location of the Ark of the Covenant in a second, twin subterranean chamber below the Great Pyramid of Egypt.

If the French team did not report a void beyond the southern passage beyond the subterranean chamber, then they have failed to scan it correctly, or the information they are reporting to you cannot be trusted. That is why I am encouraged by your desire to receive a "second opinion", In this approach too, you and I are similar; the Japanese will no doubt do better, when they return this "summer". The scanner should be positioned at the end of the tunnel.






The reason I say this, is because previous scientific teams have already established, not only that there is a stone block at the end of the section, but also that a core sample outside the block has detected sand - French scientific team 1989 - Information provided by the Supreme Council of Antiquities, Science Office. So, when my research indicated that a stone was at the end of the south tunnel, they said, "Yes, you're right, we know this already."

It is my wish, to be thorough and trustworthy for you always, and to that aim I will commit to supporting your efforts with a single call (quarterly), as each new season begins; followed by a letter to summarize our progress and thoughts. This way, you are not overwhelmed with correspondence and I allow you to do your job, for which I have the utmost confidence in you.

It is clear now that Mr. Hawass is staking his reputation publicly on finding the tomb of Khufu in the vicinity of the newly discovered passage, behind the throne. He will not find it. In fact, if I continue to mention the tomb of Khufu along with the location of the Ark Box, then I run the risk generating a conflict with him, which I seek to avoid. Let us allow him look for the tomb of Khufu, and I will speak only of the location of the Ark of the Covenant, from now on. Mr. Hawass is following a hunch, but we will follow the data. The project website does not mention the tomb of Khufu, but only mentions the Ark of the Covenant. This will be the primary focus of my endeavors.

To this end, I want to inform you that the Science office of the Supreme Council of Antiquities has already confirmed my status as a free consultant to aid you and your team. I do not wish to be separated from the project completely, as I would like to be part of the scientific analysis later. I hope that my request for anonymity and refusal to get paid has not interpreted as complete withdrawal. I am here to support you throughout, indeed the SCA will require the full weight of my research and support to resist any claims that other nations might make upon the discovery, and upon ownership of our scientific treasures. But these things do not concern us now.

As a backup option, it is possible to probe beyond the stone block, with an endoscope, like the one used to view and record images from the new passageway discovered recently. The present hole was drilled by the French team in 1989. The technology has advanced greatly since 1989 and I myself possess a 10-meter fiber-optic endoscope. However, let us see how the Japanese team progresses first.







I don't feel that I need to remind you of the importance of this project to Egypt, and to the world, because it was evident to me that you understood it well when I presented my research data to you last October. As your people said themselves, the discovery of the Ark of the Covenant through the interpretation of the religious texts, using the scientific method, would be a "scientific revolution".

Finally, I will leave you with the words of a prophet:

"Hope is a good thing, maybe the best of things, and no good thing ever dies".

I will call you again in the summer.
